A variety of events and activities including 'Pookkalams' (floral carpet), games, feasts, cultural entertainments and etc. are a part of the 10-day long festival season. This is a perfect time to visit Kerala and know more about the affluent cultural richness of the God's Own Country. It's beyond just sights and sounds, it's a fulfilling experience that connects you with the soul of the destination.

The Legend of Mahabali

To test the generosity of the king, Vamana request him for three steps of land. Mahabali instantly agrees to the request of Vamana.




Vamana grew in size. With his two steps, he covered the heaven and the Earth. He put the third on Mahabali's head and pushed him to netherworld.

The 10 days that follow the day of 'Atham' in the month of 'Chingam' are a period of big festivities in Kerala. On the day of Atham, the festival season gets a symbolic takeoff with the famous 'Athachamayam' – a procession that features art forms, tableaus and so on, held in Thripunithura, Ernakulam. Thrikkakara Vamana Moorthy Temple has a 10-day Onam festival. Yet another event on the Uthradam day happens at the Aranmula temple. 'Thiruvonathoni', a boat carrying Onam delicacies, will reach the temple from Kattur Mana.

This feast is an important aspect of Onam. Apart from homes, these feasts are also conducted in various parts of the state including the Aranmula and Thrikkakara temples in a grand manner. Feasts are also conducted in Guruvayoor.

The Aranmula temple feast is known as 'Vallasadya' and includes up to 60 items that are all vegetarian. When you go to the northern parts of Kerala, especially destinations such as Kannur,

Farming Rituals

The month of Chingam is also the season of harvest in Kerala



Legends and myths are a rich part of Onam. However, Onam is also Kerala's harvest festival. The first harvest occurs during the month of Chingam and is known as 'Chingakoythu'. As it extends to the month of 'Kanni', it is also referred to as 'Kannikoythu'. In places such as Kuttanad and Palakkad, harvest follows the rainy season. The lush fields of Kuttanad are all set to welcome the harvest season.

Illam Nira is a tradition that falls on the first Sunday after 'Karkidaka Vavu'. Rice is harvested and taken to homes and filled on the worship rooms. It is still religiously observed in old households. Puthari is another observance of making rice dishes using the fresh harvest. Niraputhari observed in Guruvayoor temple is famous. Sabarimala temple also opens for Niraputhari that falls on August 4.

In the northern Malabar region, this extends from Karkkidakam to Uthradam days. 'Onakkazhchakal' is yet another ritual observed in temples where devotees make offerings. On the day of Uthradam, one can see rows of 'Kazhchakulas' or bunches of banana offered at the Guruvayoor Temple.

Times have changed, however the concept of buying new cloths in this season hasn't changed. 'Kasavu' dresses are the most preferred kinds of attires in this time. Kasavu Mundus and Kasavu Sarees are sold across the State in large quantities. Onam is also the most lucrative season for the garment sector in Kerala.

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Onam Games

Festive spirit goes to the next level with these exciting events



The festive spirit of Onam is enkindled with a number of Onam games that are played locally. Kerala has various such games and one of the most popular ones played during Onam time is the 'Pulikkali'. Though there are various versions of Pulikkali , the most popular one is played in Thrissur.

'Kummattikkali', an exciting Onam game, is also popularly practised in Thrissur. Sometimes Kummattikkali can be seen in between Pulikkali. 'Thiruvathirakkali' is also a muchperformed dance form that is held across the State during Onam. One of the more traditional Onam games is the 'Onathallu'. Being an agricultural

festival, Onam also brings with it various games related to the fields. 'Maramadi' is one of these games and is practised among agricultural communities. Apart from these popular games, Onam is also a time when various other not-so-common ethnic games such as Thalapanthukali, Kaduva Kali, Karadikkali, Kilithattu Kali, Kuttiyum Kolum and Manikya Chembazhukka are played.



Pookkalam

Floral carpets are a symbol of prosperity and joy



Pookkalam (floral carpet) can rightly be described as one of the faces of the Onam celebration. Athappokkalam is symbolic of prosperity and joy. Starting from the day of Atham, pookkalams are created in Malayali households across the State. It is believed that these pookkalams are made to welcome Mahabali. In earlier times, only locally available flowers were used to create pookkalams. These days, flowers from far and wide also find their place in these pookkalams, making them visually stunning.

The designing of these pookkalams are a popular recreational event

these days. There are several regional differences in the way these pookkalams are created. On the first day, only one row of flowers will be created. On the second day, two rows will be created. The size of the pookkalam will keep increasing this way. On the day of Moolam, the Pookkalam will be square-shaped and will be known as 'Moolakkalam'. The largest Pookkalam will be designed on the day of Uthradam. These days, several clubs, offices and associations conduct Pookkalam competitions, adding to the zest of Onam celebrations.

Ritual Arts

If it's Padayani in south Kerala, then it is Theyyam in the north



northern parts of Kerala **L** are much famed for practising ritualistic art forms during the Onam times. This is a region where the art form of Theyyam is practised widely. Onam is the season of Kutti Theyyams Kolathunadu, these areas. In 'Adivedan' (a form of Lord Shiva) visits households to welcome Chingam with joy and prosperity. Kids are usually selected to perform this. Another Theyyam that eliminates the evils of Karkkidakam and brings in prosperity is the Sheepothi. Again, kids are the ones who perform this Theyyam, but as goddess Mahalakshmi. 'Onathar' is another traditional folk art performed

in Kannur and Kasargod districts from the day of Atham and it announces the coming of Thiruvonam.

Considered to be a representation of Mahabali, 'Onapottan' is also a folk art figure who visits households during Onam. The Parappana temple in Kozhikode is dedicated to Onapottan. Neelamperoor Padayani is a famous 16-day event that begins from the day of Avittam and ends on the day of Pooram.

Shopping Season


People throng shops during the time of discounts & schemes



There is no bigger shopping season ▲ in Kerala than Onam. It is literally a celebration in the market place as people shop in large numbers. From garments to household items and electronics to automobiles, there is hardly any sector that doesn't gain from the grand Onam sale. This also allows them to offer attractive discounts and schemes. The busiest day of the season is often Uthradam. 'Uthradapachil' is a term commonly referred to denote this bustling activity in the markets. This Onam is special for Kerala as stringent Covid restrictions have been lifted. So, the Onam celebrations will be grand and in full swing in 2022.

Apart from these festivities, Onam is also celebrated in the tribal communities of Wayanad. 'Kambala' galas are held in the paddy fields to celebrate the rich harvest. Kambala is performed accompanied by the rhythm of 'Thudi'. They observe the Thiruvonam day as 'Lakshmi Vilayattam Day'. They also worship cattle specially during the Thiruvonam day. The common Onam rituals of Malayalees are not prevalent among the tribal communities.
